Women’s rights might be guaranteed through policy; they will be achieved through practice – as doers. The good news for Rendle's readers is that they will be able to judge his arguments based on real-time results. Several annual conferences across the country are implementing much of what he advocates, and their progress will be relatively easy to track

The bad news is that, despite his expertise in leadership and organizational development—or perhaps because of it—*Back to Zero* will be of limited use to those not in positions of authority within the church. This wide section of pastors, lay leaders, and passionate citizens may find value in his premises, but will have to work out the practical implications on their own. – Ministry Matters review

Grace and Grit: My Fight for Equal Pay and Fairness at Goodyear and Beyond. Lilly Ledbetter and Lanier Scott Isom. 2012. 288p. Crown Archetype.

Ledbetter's amazing story takes us from a poor Alabama county to the U.S. Supreme Court, then on to Congress and the White House, where history was made on January 29, 2009, when the law named for her was signed, guaranteeing equal pay for equal work. After finishing high school and raising two children, the author entered the workforce at age 31 for a minimum wage, and 10 years later, she completed manager training at a local Goodyear plant. On the factory floor, she was warned "to choose my words and actions carefully . . . anything could be twisted . . . (beware ruffling feathers) . . . or I'd pass them on the way down." With remarkable bravery and determination, she endured years of harassment in various management posts until she learned that she was substantially underpaid. Hers is a thought-provoking profile in courage as she sought legal recourse, which led to the 2009 equal-pay law. This is an important book for library patrons, as Ledbetter teaches valuable lessons in her excellent autobiography. A must-read. Booklist review

King Peggy: An American Secretary, Her Royal Destiny, and the Inspiring Story of How She Changed an African Village. Peggelene Bartels and Eleanor Herman. 2012. 352p. Doubleday.

Bartels was a native of Ghana living in the U.S., working as secretary to the Ghanaian embassy, when a relative called to give her startling news. Following the death of her uncle, a village king, the council of elders had determined that she would be his successor. Bartels, who'd come to the U.S. to study and had become a U.S. citizen, hadn't been home since the death of her mother. But she accepted the daunting prospect with determination and brio. She would rule part-time, traveling between Washington, D.C., and Ghana. Bartels, along with coauthor Herman, chronicles her journey from secretary to king of the poor and isolated village of Otum, 60 miles from the capital of Accra

Blending the interdisciplinary approaches of a Buddhist nun, Certified Listening Professional, teaching fellow at Lutheran Theological Seminary, and cofounder of Gather the Women Global Matrix, the four editors have twined their wisdom with those of the outstanding contributors to this essay collection to create a “dynamic conversation” about women’s spiritual leadership power. Reconnection with women’s deepest spiritual roots and global reclamation of women’s rightful place as spiritual leaders are two necessary steps examined in four “explorations” featuring writing from diverse individuals, including author Jean Bolen, a physician, and Benedictine nun Joan Chittester. Each exploration into empowerment, spirituality, diversity, women’s collective impact, and the channeling of transformative powers ends with a focus on leadership, which includes specific questions, blessings, leadership tools, and a culminating “Digging Deeper.”

The Student Leadership Challenge is based on the findings outlined in Kouzes and Posner’s classic work The Leadership Challenge. “The fundamental purpose of The Student Leadership Challenge is to assist students—whether in a formal or unofficial leadership position or not—in furthering their abilities to lead others to get extraordinary things done” (Kouzes & Posner, 2008b, p. 2). The book is written so that undergraduate student leaders may strengthen their leadership abilities and is intended to be practical and inspirational.

Intended as a textbook or guidebook for undergraduates who are developing their leadership potential, this work reads like a conversation between the authors and the college student leader.

“It’s a big job for a small boy.” Malusi cares for his grandfather’s sheep and goats, and this title’s dramatic, accessible images show him working barefoot in the South African veld as he shouts at the hungry baboon who hopes to grab a lamb (“Hamba! Go away!”), and he is careful to avoid the snake coiled up beneath the grass. His friend laughs when Malusi shares his dream of becoming president. But then one day, a big car, shiny and new, stops at the village, and the passenger (whom many will recognize as Nelson Mandela) tells the boys that, at their age, he also looked after sheep. Daly’s beautiful watercolor artwork—rendered in thick black lines and lots of red and green accents—captures the daily struggle in the poor, rural village from the child’s viewpoint as well as the beauty and the harshness of the landscape. The back matter includes a note confirming that Mandela was indeed a herd boy in his village, and a glossary that reflects the rich South African mix across cultures. Booklist review

In *This Will be Remembered of Her*, three strands – stories from Scripture, stories of select women from around the globe and stories from religious, folk and wisdom traditions worldwide – are woven into one strong braid showing how life can be made more compelling, communal and just for all people. In the end the book asks: How will you be remembered?
