love St. Paul's letter to the church at Corinth, which appears as I Corinthians in our New Testament. There is a problem in Corinth. Over and over, Paul deals with a series of problems inside the church fellowshipmembers are suing each other, they can't agree on issues of personal morality, and they can't even celebrate communion without controversy. Problems, problems, and more problems. I love this letter because it is pastoral correspondence to a congregation of ordinary Christians who are real human beings, and not stained-glass saints who are idealized. The letter demonstrates that the power of God is at work amidst a congregation of real people.

**O**ne problem in Corinth related to a faction centered around the teaching of Paul and a faction centered around the teaching of Apollos. Some were saying "I belong to Paul, while other said "I belong to Apollos." (By the way, the New Testament offers no evidence that there was a problem between Paul and Apollos themselves. The controversy was between groups in the Corinthian congregation.) Paul responds to the situation by writing:

"What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labor of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building." (I Corinthians 3:5-9)

**P**aul is pointing out to the Corinthians that in the church leadership is instrumental, not an end in itself. It's not about Paul or Apollos; it's about Jesus.

I believe our United Methodist system of clergy deployment reflects this perspective concerning clergy leadership. Pastors make themselves available for assignment, the Bishop and Cabinet determine where pastors will be deployed, and congregations receive pastors who are sent.

**W**hen I was doing research for our bicentennial in 2011, it was humbling to discover that I was the 93<sup>rd</sup> pastor of this congregation. Many of you have been in this congregation for a long time, but I suspect that few of you could name more than four or five senior pastors out of that long list of 93. I am just one of many in the long line of pastors assigned here.

The revelation that I was number 93 helped me to appreciate in a new way the nature of my role here. Sometimes our language betrays us. In conversation with others I have often referred to Wooster United Methodist Church as "my church." But it is not "my" church. St. Paul says, **'We are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building."** (I Corinthians 3:9)

**T**he church belongs to God. The clergy don't own the church. But the laity don't own the church either. In my research for the bicentennial, I came across the names of many lay people who have come and gone and are only vaguely remembered in the historical documents of our congregation. You wouldn't know their names if I listed them.

**W**e do not own the church; the church belongs to God. What we do together is meaningful because we are part of a much larger story. We are God's people. Whether as a pastor, or as a lay person, we enter the stream of the congregation's life for a time. Some of us are here for a long time, others are here only a few years, and then leave this congregation to be a part of God's people in another place. Since I have been your senior pastor our pastoral staff has presided at 191 funerals. During that same period, 208 persons have been received as members here. (Some individuals are on both lists.) Others have moved away, and are members in other congregations in other communities and in other states or other countries.

In the end, all these congregational streams flow together, in the words of one of my favorite children's stories, "Downstream where the river meets the sea." (from *Emmet Otter's Jug-Band Christmas*) In the words of hymn and scripture, "Yes, we'll gather at the river, the beautiful, the beautiful river; gather with the saints at the river that flows by the throne of God."

It has been my privilege to be your pastor for a season. But soon it will be time for your 94<sup>th</sup> senior pastor, Rev. Charlie Tobias. If you are as gracious towards him as you have been towards me, he will be blessed, indeed. (And I expect that of you!)

**W**ith the transition on July 1, I will no longer be your pastor; our relationship will be changed. Even though I will be living in the community, I will no longer be performing pastoral functions for you. Look to your new pastor for baptisms, weddings, funerals, and support during trying moments of life. I know you will be blessed through his ministry.



#### The Birth of the Church

**F**ifty days after the Resurrection, the first Christians, most of them Jews, gathered to celebrate the Jewish harvest festival known as Pentecost.

At that gathering something happened that was so awesome and indescribable that when writing about it, St. Luke could only use metaphors. A sound like the rush of a violent wind seemed to fill the entire house where they were meeting. Something like tongues of fire appeared among them — a tongue rested on each of them. It was then that they "were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability" (Acts 2:4, NRSV). The crowd that gathered outside was amazed and perplexed.

They wanted to know what it meant. Some observers thought it was a gathering of drunks. But Peter interpreted it all correctly to anyone who would listen. He told of Christ, his life, his mission, his death and his Resurrection. Most importantly, Peter explained that God had made Jesus both Lord and Messiah. The proof of that was the Resurrection.

Three thousand people were so moved by Peter's words that they were baptized that day and "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42, NRSV).

"And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved" (Acts 2:47, NRSV). The Church was born that day.

#### Five Biggest Mistakes You Make Recycling

If you're making the effort to recycle (and you should be!), make sure you're doing it right.

You're probably on autopilot when it comes to tossing your bottles and plastic, but it's worth taking stock of how you recycle. Are you making these common missteps?

1. Assuming an item isn't recyclable. You might be surprised to learn that you can keep old CDs, furniture, mattresses, wine corks, aluminum foil, and lots more out of landfills these days. Often,

you'll have to take these items to a recycling center, but some may be left curbside. CheckEarth911.com/recycling (or download their handy smartphone app) to find out more about your local policies. We do not inherit the Earth from our ancestors, we borrow it from our children. ~ Native American Proverb

2. Throwing away plastic bottle caps. Tossing caps before recycling the bottles is no

longer a household rule. In 2012, thanks to new technology and increased demand for recycled plastics, the Association of Postconsumer Plastic Recyclers announced that recycling facilities throughout the US would begin accepting plastic bottles with caps on. Just follow these simple instructions: Empty bottle, crush, replace cap, and recycle. And check with your local recycling program to make sure they have started accepting caps.

3. Recycling dirty paper and cardboard. We use 69 million tons of paper in this country every year (it's 27% of our municipal waste, according to the EPA), so learning how to recycle it correctly is critical. Even small amounts of soiled paper and cardboard can ruin an entire batch of material at a recycling facility. But don't trash your greasy pizza box yet. Remove the clean parts and recycle with the rest of your paper goods.

4. Throwing out plastic bags (and using them at all). If only the "urban tumbleweed" littering the streets made me feel like I was in a western film. These bags often don't even make it to the trash, and few people make the effort to bring them back to the grocery store's recycling bins. The solution? Try reusable shopping bags. You'll reduce your waste, and may even save some cash in the process. Today, some stores offer a small credit for bringing your own bags.

5. Recycling before repurposing. Recycling is great, but it still eats up energy, so get creative with your recyclable items before you kick them to the curb. For instance, yogurt containers make for great seed starters, and glass jars can become vases, pencil cups, votive holders, and ... well, you're on Pinterest for a reason, right?
