

## From the Chairman of the Staff Parish Relations Committee: Charles Brain

The following information is about the process to select a pastor to replace Rev. Dr. David Wilcox. This information was presented to the congregation at all three services on February 9, but due to the severe weather that morning, attendance was very low. Therefore, I welcome the opportunity to provide you with this information again on behalf of the Staff Parish Relations Committee.

As I am sure you know, David announced he will be requesting retirement at the Annual Conference held in June and will conclude his active ministry with us at the end of June. Also, as you are aware, Rev. Larry Black announced his intention to step down as Minister of Congregational Care sometime this summer after consultation with the new Senior Pastor of our church.

Our new pastor will be appointed to our church through *the United Methodist Appointment Process*. The United Methodist Church functions as the Body of Christ through the "connectional system." This means that all United Methodist Churches work together and share resources in an effort to faithfully offer Christ to the world. In the connectional system, all churches pool their financial, physical and human resources through the paying of apportionments, the holding of all property "in trust" and the itinerancy of ordained pastors, which means the movement of pastors by the bishop to meet the leadership needs of the churches and mission field served by the conference. All ordained pastors, known as ordained elders, vow to be itinerant. In addition, the connectional system includes local pastors, such as Rev. Jon Hutchison, who are licensed for ministry and appointed to a church.

The Appointment Process has three steps:

**Step One** follows the announcement that a church has an open position such as David's retirement or the appointment of a pastor to another church. In this step, the Staff Parish Relations Committee, representing the church, meets with the District Superintendent to explain the qualities in a pastor we need to advance the church and our mission for Christ's purposes. This has already occurred.

**Step Two** is when the person is identified who is perceived to be the best match for our church. The process involves the District Superintendent presenting the church profile developed with the SPR Committee to the Cabinet, which is composed of the bishop, the assistant to the bishop and the 10 district superintendents. This is a very prayerful process. Pastors are nominated to fill the "open" position with explanations as to why he or she would be a good fit for our church. All pray and vote for five persons. Questions for clarification are received. All pray and vote for three. All pray and initial each superintendent's top choice. Discussion and more prayer continue until all initials are on the same name. This is the person who is perceived to be the best match for the needs of the church and its mission field. This is the step of the process we are currently in.

**Step Three** is when the District Superintendent meets with the identified pastor and discusses our church profile and affirms a match. The superintendent calls the SPR Committee chair to arrange an introductory meeting with the committee. Conversation with the SPR Committee confirms the fit. Announcements are made at both the sending and receiving churches the following Sunday. The appointment is officially set at the Annual Conference and the new pastor starts his or her new appointment on July 1.

#### Some other points.

First, Larry Black's position is not subject to the Appointment Process. Once the new pastor is "on board," Larry's replacement will be filled upon the recommendation of the new pastor in consultation with Rev. Black and the SPR Committee.

Also, Church Council has approved the recommendation of the SPR Committee to purchase a parsonage for our Senior Pastor. A number of years ago, upon the retirement of Rev. Frank Marlett in 1992, the church sold the parsonage to Rev. Marlett. Since then, our Senior Pastors have received a housing allowance in lieu of our providing a parsonage. A committee has been formed to locate and purchase a parsonage upon the approval at a Charge Conference. This committee has already begun the process to identify an appropriate parsonage. Proceeds from the sale of the parsonage to Rev. Marlett were invested by the Trustees and the fund has grown sufficiently to provide adequate funding for a new parsonage.

I personally have been impressed with the process to obtain a replacement for Rev. Wilcox and am confident that the right person will be appointed to our church.
